

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 5 at 6:00 pm – NEXT HEALING SERVICE


Please join us in the chapel as we invite the healing nature of the Holy Spirit into our midst for those who seek prayer for themselves, family, or friends.

Sunday, January 26

John 5:2-18 When Jesus saw him and knew he had been ill for a long time, he asked him, "Would you like to get well?" (v.6 NLT)

I was diagnosed with Tinnitus, ringing in the ears, over twenty years ago. At first, it was overwhelming. But, over time, I learned to cope with the Tinnitus.

Today, as I read this Scripture again, I was convicted. I realized that I had grown complacent in seeking the Lord's healing. I've prayed, maybe twice, for the Tinnitus to be healed. Because, honestly, I've gotten accustomed to having the constant ringing in my ears. Plus, it seemed minor compared to my other health issues.

I felt like Jesus was asking me, "Kirsten, would you like to get well?"

"Yes, I would."

I am praying that Jesus will heal the Tinnitus. He doesn't want me to cope with it or grow accustomed to it. He paid the price for all my diseases to be healed. Not just the ones I think are important.

If you haven't asked Jesus to heal something in your life because you've learned to cope with it or you don't think it is "big" enough, I invite you to join me in praying for healing today. Right now. Isaiah 47:1-15; Psalms 63:1-11, 98; Hebrews 10:19-31

Monday, January 27

Galatians 1:1-17 Am I now trying to win the approval of human beings, or of God? Or am I trying to please people? If I were still trying to please people, I would not be a servant of Christ. (v.10)

I sometimes think I was born a people pleaser. I've struggled with it most of my life.

God didn't create us to please people. We were created to please God. That's why trying to please people will literally suck the life out of us. It becomes this huge burden that we carry around. It's as if we are carrying the people we're trying to please on our backs like dead weight. The more people we try to please the heavier our burden grows.

We will never be able to please other people all the time. There will always be someone not happy with what we said or did. Plus, if we're spending all our time trying to please people we will have no time to please God.

If you are a people pleaser like me, let's hand all the people we are carrying over to God. Then let's ask Jesus how we can live a life pleasing to him. Jesus promises to give rest to all who carry heavy burdens (Matthew 11:28). So, let's give him ours.

Isaiah 48:1-11; Psalms 41, 52; Mark 5:21-43

Tuesday, January 28

Mark 6:1-13 But in the next breath they were cutting Him down: He's just a carpenter—Mary's boy. We've known Him since He was a kid. We know His brother, James, Justus, Jude, and Simon, and his sisters. Who does He think He is? They tripped over what little they knew about Him and fell, sprawling. And they never got any further. (v.3 MSG)

My past includes behaviors like being a high school dropout, a pregnant teenager, an alcoholic, and someone who could never finish anything. I lost count of how many times I tried to change, but then fell back into my old habits. People from my "hometown" had their hopes dashed time and again.

So, you can imagine the thoughts running through their heads when I became a Christian and then enrolled in college. They wanted to have hope, but it was hard for them to not trip over what they knew about me. And once they fell, they never got any further than my past.

Jesus knew exactly how I felt because the people in his hometown got tripped up over his past too. He helped me walk through the hurt I felt when it seemed no one believed in me. And it is only with his strength that we were able to prove them wrong. With Jesus, your past is your past because he makes you a new creation and the old passes away (2 Corinthians 5:17).

Isaiah 48:12-21; Psalm 45; Galatians 1:18—2:10

Wednesday, January 29

Galatians 2:11-21 We Jews know that we have no advantage of birth over "non-Jewish sinners." We know very well that we are not set right with God by rule-keeping but only through personal faith in Jesus Christ. How do we know? We tried it—and we had the best system of rules the world has ever seen! Convinced that no human being can please God by self-improvement, we believed in Jesus as the Messiah so that we might be set right before God by trusting in the Messiah, not by trying to be good. (vv.15-16)

I can make a rule out of anything. It is a special gift that I have.

Before becoming a Christian, my life was chaos. So, I determined that to do a good job at this whole Jesus thing, I better make sure that I controlled the chaos by creating order in every area of my life.

My day was scheduled by one rule after another. I had to read the Bible for a specific amount of time. I had to read a set number of devotionals each day. I had to set an alarm to pray for a pre-determined length of time. Yet, nowhere in my day did I spend time getting to know Jesus.

It was all about the rules. Being good. Self-improvement. But I was missing the key ingredient, a relationship with Jesus. Rule keeping and trying to be a better person are not bad. However, if you don't have a personal relationship with Jesus none of those things will matter.

Jesus is all about quality relationship time—not the quantity of time keeping rules.

Isaiah 49:1-12; Psalm 119:49-72; Mark 6:13-29

Thursday, January 30

Isaiah 49:13-23 Look here. I have made you a part of Me, written you on the palms of My hands. Your city walls are always on My mind, always My concern. (v.16 The Voice)

In elementary school, I had this paranoia of being forgotten at school. That no one would come pick me up. It made no sense because my parents had never forgotten to pick me up. Yet still, I worried about being forgotten. This concern got worse during my adolescent years. And it carried into my young adult years as well.

I remember the first time that I read the Scripture above. I felt a sense of peace completely fill me. Right there in God's word was the reassurance that I had been looking for my entire life. Jesus would never forget me because my name was written on the palms of his hands. I was a part of him. I was always on his mind and always his concern.

I don't know about you, but for me that was the best news, ever! No more worrying about being forgotten. Just the assurance that Jesus was always with me, and I was always with him.

Psalm 50; Galatians 3:1-14; Mark 6:30-46

Friday, January 31

Isaiah 50:1-11 Each morning, it is God who wakes me and tells me what I should do, what I should say. (v.4d)

At the beginning of 2024, I had a morning routine that I followed each day when I got up. I listened to Scripture and devotionals. I did stretches, took medicine/supplements, and ate. Then came my extensive "to do" list.

I became very dissatisfied with that morning routine. I felt like something was missing. Then the Lord placed two questions on my heart. 1) Jesus, how do you want to spend our time together today? 2) What can I do for you today, Lord?

Those questions changed everything for me. Instead of following my plan for my day it turned my focus to what God's plan was for our day. It had me partner with Jesus from the moment my eyes fluttered open. I began listening for his voice to direct my day.

I still sometimes must practice asking those questions because I default to doing *my* routine *my* way. Thankfully, Jesus gives me grace on those days. His plans for *our* day are always available, I just need to ask and listen.

Psalms 40, 54; Galatians 3:15-22; Mark 6:47-56

Saturday, February 1

Psalm 55 Open your ears, God, to my prayer; don't pretend you don't hear me knocking. (v.1 MSG)

When I read those verses, I get a vivid picture of a desperate child begging God to listen as he/she prays. And when He doesn't answer fast enough, the child begins knocking as hard as his/her little fists can bang on the door. Can you see the child?

I think we've all felt like that at one time. Desperate to know God hears our crying out in pain. Wanting Him to answer immediately. Hoping if we pray louder/faster that He will hear us. I know I have.

The humanness found in the Psalms is comforting. It shows me that the Lord knew we were going to feel desperate and lots of other emotions. But the best part of this psalm is that later it tells us the Lord hears us and that He will care for us.

We have the assurance that God's ears are open to our prayers, that He hears us knocking, and that He will care for us. May that bring us peace. Especially, during those times when we feel desperate like the child above.
